Epiphany - January 9th – 13th Prayer Revival


Lent - February 26 – April 6, 40 days prayer/ fasting

OUR CHURCH & HISTORY

Christ Our Redeemer African Methodist Episcopal Church (COR) is the largest A.M.E. Church in Orange County. Since 1991, over 3,700 men, women, and children have connected with COR to belong to an ethnically diverse group of congregants seeking to shape their behavior in line with their belief in Jesus, Christ as their Lord and Savior.

On Sunday, February 3, 1991, Rev. Linda Parker, Gwen Oden, and 25 other believers founded COR on the University of California, Irvine (U.C.I.) campus under the auspices of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, Fifth Episcopal District. Led by a series of pastors (Rev. Douglas Patterson, Rev. Parcel Hector, Rev. Crystalline Weaver, and Rev. Edgar Jones), from 1992 through 1998, COR moved to various Orange County locations.

Breaking the string of pastors in August 1998, Rev. Mark E. Whitlock, Jr. was appointed to lead COR and its 10-member congregation where they moved to Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church in Irvine and worshiped at 3P on Sundays. COR eventually was blessed to purchase its own facility at 46 Maxwell and later 45 Tesla, Irvine, California.

In October 2019, Reverend Dr. Ralph E. Williamson was appointed pastor at COR. Rev. Williamson had previously been pastor at First AME Church in Las Vegas for over the last 16 years. Rev. Williamson led COR through the challenging year of 2020, to include the COVID-19 pandemic, unprecedented shootings of unarmed Black men and women and economic challenges.

OUR NAME

AFRICAN: Our Heritage

The word “African” means that the A.M.E. Church was organized by people of African descent and heritage. It does not mean the A.M.E. Church was founded in Africa or for people of African heritage only.

The African Methodist Episcopal Church is a diverse, multicultural denomination with members of every race, creed, and nationality.

METHODIST: What we believe

The AME Church is a member of the family of Methodist Churches.

EPISCOPAL: How our church operates

The word “Episcopal” refers to the form of government under which the church operates. The chief executives and administrative officers of the AME Church are the bishops.

CHURCH: A community of Christian believers

The “Church” is a community of people who believe in God and who have accepted Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior.

OUR MOTO: “God Our Father, Christ Our Redeemer, the Holy Spirit our Comforter, Humankind Our Family” is a great summary of what the African Methodist Episcopal Church believes.

MEMBERS CAN SERVE ON THE FOLLOWING:

Commission on Christian Education

- Shall carefully study the Christian Education needs of the local church and the means for meeting these needs, with adequate and appropriate literature and proper equipment for the various age groups.

Commission on Membership, Evangelism, and Discipleship

- Shall study the demographics of the community it seek to minister, identify opportunities for the church to engage in meaningful ministries.

Commission on Stewardship and Finance

- Shall set up a budget for the church take action to provide the income sufficient to cover the same and shall administer the funds received.

Commission on Mission and Welfare

- Is to survey and study the needs of the church and the community. It shall oversee and control the local church programs of welfare.

Commission on Health

- Assess the health needs of the congregation, organize a health guild, develop health education training and projects for the congregation, serve as a resource for health information and collaborate with community health agencies and associations.

Commission on Social Action

- Coordinate activities in the areas of social, racial and economic relations; temperance; world peace.

Commission on Public Relations

- It shall be responsible for gathering and disseminating information of public interest to the secular press, religious press, network and cable as other various medias. It shall be responsible for intra- congregation communion as well.

WHAT EVERY MEMBER SHOULD KNOW

What is salvation?

Salvation connects us permanently to the God in whose likeness and image we were created. He saved us, not on the basis of deeds which we have done in righteousness, but according to His mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewing of our mind. Each individual must confess with their mouth and believe in their heart that Jesus is the Son of God (See Romans 10:9-10). Salvation redeems forever the eternal soul of humankind to God who is love.

What is baptism?

Jesus answered, "I tell you the truth, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless he is born of water and the Spirit". (John 3:5) Baptism is not only a sign of our profession of faith and mark of our difference; but it is also a sign of regeneration or the new birth. (See John 3:3-5; Romans 6:3-4) There are three methods of baptism recognized in the AME Church: (a) sprinkling; (b) pouring; and (c) immersion.

What is prayer?

Prayer is a conversation that allows us the privilege to communicate with God through our praise, petitions, and supplications. Prayer is extremely important in the life of the believer. We will never know who God is until we develop an intimate prayer life.

What is the Holy Communion/The Lord's Supper?

The Lord's Supper is a symbol of Christ's suffering and death. The bread and wine represent his broken body and shed blood. We take Communion because our Lord Jesus Christ commanded all who love Him and who seek to follow after Him. Holy Communion is served on the first Sunday of every month.

WHAT SHOULD I DO?

If I am sick or hospitalized:

Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. (James 5:14)
The class leader serves as the direct point of contact as a mediator between the member and the pastor. The church office should also be notified to follow up with visitation and meeting the spiritual needs of the person/family member.

In the event of a death:

The loss of a loved one is painful and can be very overwhelming. Members should contact their class leader and call the church immediately to follow up with visitation and meeting the spiritual needs of the person/family member.

If I need counseling:

Contact the church office to make an appointment. Spiritual counseling is made available free of charge to church members for personal matters, marriage, death and grief counseling. The church does not have a licensed therapist or psychologist.

If I need emergency assistance:

Benevolent assistance is made available to those who are in need on a first come basis and as funds are available. All persons must complete a benevolence application. If approved, funds are paid to the vendor and not the applicant for emergency assistance only. Persons who make a request do not have to be a member of COR A.M.E. Church.
